As I write this two significant events are taking place! It is Candlemas Day – the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord in the Temple – and it's Groundhog Day! It is the 40th day after Christmas, a day in which we

celebrate the Lord Jesus being presented in the temple by his parents. This feast is commemorated by the blessing of candles as a reminder that Jesus is the Light of the World. The St. William Quilters have now been meeting weekly since 1988. In that time, they have donated more than \$100,000 to the building fund for St. William Church.

In the beginning, the ladies would make a handmade quilt every year to raffle at our summer festival in June. The quilt would take most of the year to make and then they would sell the raffle tickets after Sunday Mass, at Sparkle Market, and during the festival. They would raise as much as \$5000 on each quilt. Their main objective has always been to donate money to the building fund.

But it has also been a perfect way for these quilt lovers to get together every week for social time while working on their projects. As a service to the community, the group also complete quilts for a small fee for anyone wanting their project hand quilted. When the yearly festival ended, the craft shows and trunk sales took its place. The quilters started making smaller items such as baby quilts and bibs, place mats, napkins, table runners, wall hangings, Christmas items, and much more. These items are always available for sale every Tuesday between 9am & 1pm.

This year, the quilters have decided to make lap quilts to donate to charity. They have accumulated a great amount of donated fabric and would like to use it to help others. However, this endeavor will take many hands to complete. Your help is greatly needed.

16 oz cream cheese 1 tsp cinnamon 1 1/4 cup sugar, divided 1 tsp vanilla

Directions:

Unroll 1 can of crescent rolls into the bottom of a 9x13 pan. Don't press seams together!

Mix cheese with 1 cup of sugar and vanilla; spread over rolls.

Place second can of rolls over top.

Pour melted margarine on and top with mixture of 1/4 cup sugar and cinnamon. Bake for 30 minutes at 350.

The St. William Clothes Closet, known as Rene's Closet, has been in service to those in need of clothing for over 10 years now. It was originally the idea of Rene' Marrangoni who saw a need in the community to offer clothes to those in need. Sadly, Rene' died unexpectedly and the clothing donation center almost did not happen. Luckily, Rene's good friends Debi Hayes and Mary Saxon stepped in and picked up where she left off. Over time those in need have increased to 25-35 clients each month, as did the donations of clothing. The closet is kept stocked by the generous donations from the community who believe in the mission of Rene's Closet. Word of mouth, signs, and local newspapers help to bring awareness to Rene's Closet.

Rene's Closet officially re-opened in its new location on Saturday, January 27, 2018. The "New & Improved" Rene's Closet is located inside St. William

Church in what was once the south end of Room 101. The new space is also home to the St. William Food Pantry. Although the space is small, it is stocked with a very nice selection of seasonally appropriate clothing for women, men, and children. Rene's Closet takes donations that are "in season" during closet hours on the fourth Saturday of each month from 9am to 1pm. 
