
CHAMPION GRADUATE ~

While attending classes full-time, I was involved in several Campus Ministry programs and events. I participated in the 9pm Mass choir every week and maintained a student leadership position as a regular cantor and lector. After participating in a first-year student retreat in the fall of 2015, I became involved as a retreat leader in 2016 and 2017, and was selected as a senior captain for first-year retreats in 2018.

I might be in Rome taking classes for a Master's in Jurisprudence, I might be elsewhere in the world doing research with the members of the vast African diaspora, or I might be here in Chicago, working hard and saving money until I find out what God's plan is for me.

I am blessed and privileged to have had a Jesuit education, and, ad majorem dei gloriam, I hope to use what I've learned to make the world a better place
