Fairs and Festivals

In Northeast Ohio, it is not difficult to find a festival that celebrates an ethnic group, culture, or historical time. Attending both fairs and festivals are great past times for people in our community. From the county fairs and seeing the biggest pumpkin to the ethnic festivals and taste testing the delicious food, it is a great time for family and friends to get together. One local festival that many people may not be aware of is the Madonna di Loreto festival in Youngstown, Ohio. It was started by the Pacentrano Club to celebrate their heritage and reenact a yearly festival from the small town of Pacentro in Italy.

Pacentro is a medieval village located in central Italy made up of only 1300 people. I was fortunate enough to visit this quaint town with my husband and family in 2014. This picturesque village is narrow streets made of stone, has a castle that dates to the 8th century and a Catholic church beautifully located in the public square. After immigrants from this region moved to Youngstown, they began a social club, keeping the traditions of their

hometown. My grandmother, Elvira Marsolo-Mangiarelli, immigrated from Pacentro and so every year we would attend this festival. It takes place the first Sunday in

Virgin Mary. Behind the musicians everyone attending this celebration follows, singing in Italian. Once the Mass and procession are completed, the activities of the festival commence. There is delicious Italian food to eat and a series of races for the children starting with the youngest age group and progressing up to the most prestigious event, the La Corsa

deli Zingari (The race of the gypsies.) In Pacentro, young adult men compete in the race up the mountain to the church of the Madonna diLoreto, running barefoot over rocks and bristle. The winner receives fine cloth for a suit. They are carried on the shoulders of the other runners and paraded around the village square.

In Youngstown at the Pacentrano Club, they carry out this tradition as well, however, the men no longer run barefoot but they do have to run a route that has challenging hills, twists, and turns. The winner does not get the cloth for a man's suit which in Pacentro was made by a fine tailor, instead they are awarded a monetary prize. The winner still receives the fanfare for his accomplishments and is paraded

September, just as in Italy. The festival begins with Mass, celebrated in Italian and then a procession carrying a statue of Our Lady of Loreto. The statue is adorned with cascading silk ribbons which people attach money to ask our Lady to intercede for some special request. It is an honor to be one of the men picked to carry this statue during the procession.

Following the statue is a group of musicians playing familiar sacred music honoring our Lord and the

In many respects with all that has been happening over the past few years, perhaps this summer, was needed more than most. It has been a slow time here at the parish although that will be changing in the coming days much like most everything else! Many of our parish groups and organizations and our parish religious education and formation programs will be starting soon after the summer hiatus. We are planning another exciting and event-full year of activities and opportunities to pray, socialize, learn, and grow. In the midst of all your family activities and Friday night football games, I hope you will be part of the many good and energizing opportunities happening at our parish.

The most exciting event in the coming weeks will be the start of our new Parking Lot Project that we have been anticipating and planning for over the past year. The final plans are being completed along with all the many details. We are looking at the week of September 11, 2022, as the start date for our project that will include a new entranceway boulevard, new lighting, new paving and landscaping, along with drainage and water control. When finished it will be a welcomed improvement and addition to the overall beauty and spirit of our parish community and property. I would like to thank all those who have supported this project through their financial gifts to our Power Up Parking Lot Campaign over the past year. A total of \$130,000.00 was collected through the campaign and added to \$100,000.00 of Fish Dinner proceeds. We have also secured an additional loan for the balance of the project. September will be an exciting time as the last piece of our parish improvement plan is completed.

With the parking lot project and the new office building our parish loan and indebtedness will be about \$350,000.00. To reduce this amount in the most efficient and resourceful way we are planning to hold a special “*St. William Super Cash Bonanza Raffle*” in the coming months. A potential grand prize of \$25,000.00 and other cash prizes could be yours!! All proceeds of the raffle will go directly to a loan payment and could be as much as half the loan in one payment! More details will be coming soon!

In the meantime, great things continue to happen at our parish! I remain ever grateful and thankful for your continued support, spirit, encouragement, and kindness shown to our parish. As I begin my fourteenth year as pastor, I continue to be amazed and inspired by the commitment and dedication of so many of you. There are great things happening at our parish due to your generous spirit and dedication. As I have said many times before... *“Saint William Parish continues to be a remarkable and special place filled with the spirit and life of Gospel!”* May God continue to bless us, our parish, and families and in these last days of summer may we all be warmed with goodness and joy!

THE EUCHARISTIC REVIVAL

I have spent many weekends away from St. William this summer but my travels always include celebrating Mass and receiving the Holy Eucharist. I feel especially blessed to live within the borders of the Catholic Diocese of Youngstown where I have the privilege to receive the Body and Blood of our Lord. After celebrating in the Archdiocese of St. Paul & Minnesota and the Diocese of Toledo, I could not wait to get to my home parish on June 19 to receive from the cup, it moved me to tears. My sister had this same experience when she visited in July and was able to receive from the cup as the Archdiocese of New York has yet to reinstitute receiving from the cup. As Catholics, we believe that every morsel of the consecrated bread and every drop of consecrated wine becomes the Body and Blood of our Lord. Once consumed we become what we eat. As the body of Christ, we have the incredible responsibility of sharing Christ with the world.

You may have heard that the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops have dedicated the next four years to The Eucharistic Revival. YEAR OF GOING OUT ON MISSION


July 21, 2024 – Pentecost 2025



CATHY'S ZUCCHINI CHOWDER

1 large chopped onion
sautéed in 1/3 cup butter
with 1 teaspoon of salt
and 1 teaspoon of pepper.
Add 2-3 chopped medium sized zucchini with a handful of fresh basil and parsley chopped. When just slightly softened add 1/3 cup flour, cook until flour is incorporated and blond color stirring gently so as not to break up zucchini. Add 2 cups of water, 1 (48oz) can of chicken broth, and 1 tablespoon of fresh lemon juice. Bring to a boil and boil for 2 minutes. Then add 2 (14.5 oz.) cans of diced Italian style tomatoes, 1 (12 oz.) can of low-fat evaporated milk, 1 can of corn, drained. Bring to boil and simmer for 5 minutes. Turn off heat. Add 1/4 cup parmesan cheese and 2 cups of sharp shredded cheddar. Taste for additional salt and pepper to your liking. Can sprinkle with more fresh herbs.



WHAT IS A CHANCE AUCTION?

A Chance Auction is part raffle, part auction, part fundraiser, and part vendor sales . It works a bit like bingo. Admission is \$8 and includes one numbered paddle.



A second paddle may be purchased for an additional \$2. You must purchase a bag of 40 chips for \$10 (each chip is worth one quarter) to use to bid on items. The items for auction will be on display for an hour before the auction begins. Each item has a retail value that determines the number of chips required to bid. Once the auction begins, the announcer will hold up the item that is up for bid and will announce how many chips are needed for that item. If interested, you will put the required number of chips in a basket on your table and hold up your paddle. The announcer will then draw a number to find a winner. If you bid and won the item, hooray! If you did not bid and your number is drawn, then call out "no bid" and the announcer will draw another number.

STS. JOACHIM AND ANNE (ANN)

Parents of the Blessed Virgin Mary

- ♦ 1st Century BCE, Palestine
- ♦ St. Anne is the patron saint of Brittany, Canada and women in labor
- ♦ Sts. Joachim and Anne are the patron saints of Grandparents

Feast Day: July 26

Sts. Joachim and Anne, both of the tribe of Judah of the royal house of David, are venerated by the Catholic church as the parents of the Blessed Virgin Mary. It is believed from ancient testimonies, that Sts. Joachim and Anne in their later years came from Galilee to settle in Jerusalem, and there the Blessed Mother of God, who was likely their only child, was born and reared. There is little mention of Sts. Joachim and Anne in the Bible or Gospels. What we do know comes from Catholic legend that Mary was promised to Joachim and Anne by an angel and that the expected child was blessed by God. We acknowledge that the Blessed Mary had good and faithful parents who raised her with love and a profound devotion to God. The other Mary mentioned in the Gospels as the sister of the Mother of God is believed to be her cousin.



St. Anne has been honored from early Christian times; churches were dedicated in her name as early as the 4th century and holy men and women spoke of her sanctity and love. St. Anne is often symbolized as teaching her little daughter to read the Holy Scriptures. St. Joachim is also honored in the Churches of the East; however, the Gospel tells us nothing about his life. We have no true primary sources that prove they even existed, but certainly we can agree that The Blessed Virgin Mary had parents. Likewise, we can agree that Sts. Joachim and Anne serve as role models for parents and both deserve to be honored and emulated for their devotion to God and Our Blessed Mary, the Mother of God.
